Spring Luncheon 2024: Research on Aging at UCR Featuring Dr. **Ilana Bennett**

UCR retirees and emeriti gathered at the Alumni and Visitors Center for our annual Spring Luncheon on May 17. UCRRA President Andy Plumley welcomed all attendees, and called a brief meeting of the UCR Retirees' Association to order. Treasurer Al Chavez gave a financial report. Andy then briefly conducted an election of UCRRA Board members for 2024-25 and received the approval of the members for a set of amendments to the UCRRA Bylaws that had been circulated before the meeting.

Emeriti Association Co-President Darleen DeMason then convened a brief Annual Meeting of the UCR Emeriti Association. Treasurer Larry Zahn gave a financial report, noting that the UCREA had a balance of \$24,707.18 in its account at Provident Bank. Darleen then presented recent winners of the Emeriti Graduate Student Travel Award with certificates. Liz Wilson, winner of the Fall 2023 award, is a Ph.D. candidate in Psychology. The two winners of the Winter 2024 award were Pedro Garcia Lopez de la Osa (Music) and Patricia Holt-Torres (Microbiology).

Darleen then invited Emeriti Association Co-President Raymond Russell to introduce Dr. Ilana Bennett. Dr. Bennett is an Associate Professor of Psychology at UCR and Co-Director of the UCR Aging Initiative. She received her bachelor's degree in cognitive science from UC Irvine and a PhD in lifespan cognitive science from Georgetown University. Her research seeks to advance our understanding of the aging brain and how it affects the way older adults acquire and receive information.

Dr. Bennett reports that she and her colleagues at UCR take a "multifaceted" approach in their research, looking at the social, neural, cellular, and molecular effects of aging. Psychologist Dr. Rachel Wu and statistician Dr. Esra Kurum have shown how interventions such as learning new skills can improve seniors' cognitive performance. Dr. Bennett has worked with bioengineer Dr. Xiaoping Hu to use MRI to shed light on diseases like Parkinson's. Dr. Joshua Morgan is a bioengineer who studies the effects of aging on cellular and molecular processes. Researchers on aging at UCR are now seeking to expand their activities by developing ties to researchers on other UC campuses and hosting speaker series, workshops, and conferences.

When asked what we seniors should be doing now to help our brains resist the effects of aging, Dr. Bennett warned that "blueberries are not enough." Research at UCR continues to show that cognitive health requires us to engage in regular vigorous exercise and to take on mentally challenging tasks like learning complex new skills.

Spring 2024 Events

Among the most memorable events of Spring 2024, retirees and emeriti toured the glamorous new Education building at UCR's School of Medicine on April 30. On May 7, Dickson Fellow and Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Entomology Brian Federici told us about an instance in which "Wasp Evolution Tricks Scientists." At the annual Spring Luncheon on May 17, Associate Professor of Psychology Ilana Bennett, Co-Director of the UCR Aging Initiative, provided an overview of the various forms of research on aging currently taking place at UCR. Emeriti Association Graduate Student Travel Award

We are very pleased to announce that during UCR's April 2024 Give Day campaign, \$6,021 was received in new gifts to the current use fund that supports the Emeriti Association's Graduate Student Travel Award, and another \$500 was contributed to the endowment. These new gifts brought the totals for each fund to \$19,354 in the current use fund, and \$35,501.21 in the endowment. Thanks to these generous gifts, the Emeriti Graduate Student Travel Award has expanded from a single award in 2021-2022 to one award per quarter beginning in 2023-2024. In Winter 2024, UCR's Graduate Division partnered with the UCREA to fund two Emeriti Graduate Student Travel Awards. To support future Graduate Student Travel Awards, emeriti and friends are encouraged to make gifts to the current use fund or to the endowment fund that support this award.

Changes in Leadership of the Emeriti Association

Larry Zahn served several terms as Treasurer of the Emeriti Association in the past, and when he was elected to a new term as Treasurer in May 2023, he agreed to serve only one year. In June 2024, Brad Hyman agreed to serve the remainder of Larry's two-year term as Treasurer through June 2025. Now that Linda has become our sole Secretary, Byron Adams has replaced Linda as Chair of the Dickson Committee. 

Spring Dickson Lecture

On May 7, Professor Brian Federici from the Department of Entomology gave his Dickson Lecture entitled "Wasp Evolution Tricks Scientists." He provided support for a paradigm shift relating to the mechanism by which parasitic wasps circumvent the immune system of their insect hosts when they oviposit eggs into them. A paradigm shift is a significant change that happens when the usual theory about something is replaced by a new and different theory. Paradigm shifts promote interest and a surge of research bringing new information about the system in question. When a female parasitic wasp oviposits into a caterpillar, she releases some "particles" that circumvent the immune system which then allows the eggs to hatch and complete the larval stage of their life cycle, to the demise of the host. These particles have always been interpreted to be products of polydnaviruses.

But Dr. Federici, who is a virologist, came up with the idea in 1991 that these were not viruses but some other type of cellular entity. He initially came to this idea because unlike other viruses, the genome does not replicate in the cells and no new virus particles are assembled or released. In the following decades more and more molecular information about these particles has come to light, which continued to show that the particles are not really virus-like. Among these data were that the organization of the genome is not similar to other viruses and the encoded gene sequences are similar to the parasitic wasp genes and not to virus genes. Dr. Federici and his research colleagues have posed a new theory that these particles are more similar to mitochondria and chloroplasts, which are organelles that also have DNA and which are thought to have originated by the encapsulation of bacteria into ancient eukaryotic cells during early evolution of the life forms on earth. Federici and his colleagues' new theory is that these wasp particles originated evolutionarily as encapsulated viruses and then evolved to become "immunosuppressant organelles" by losing their original genome and replacing it with insect immunosuppressant genes over time. This is a very exciting hypothesis with important evolutionary implications. Very recently, in 2023, Eugene Koonin and Jens Kuhn, two prominent virologists at our National Institutes of Health, unaware of Professor Federici's earlier papers, came to the same conclusion, that the polydnaviruses are not viruses. Professor Federici along with these and other scientists are now working to change the wasp virus concept to one modeled on the organelle paradigm.

This lecture was in person and live streamed with support by the UCR Emeriti and Retiree Associations, the Osher Institute and the Office of Planned Giving.







Winter Graduate Student Travel Award Winners By Darleen DeMason

During the Winter Quarter the Graduate Student Travel Award Committee reviewed ten applications from graduate students on campus who needed funding for travel to meetings to present research results or for travel to obtain research needed for their dissertations. The applicants were evenly divided between the two travel types and between science and humanities/arts/social sciences. The committee members were very impressed by the quality of work being done by the graduate students on our campus and were delighted when Dr. Emma Wilson, Associate Dean of the Graduate Division, told us we could pick two awardees and they would share the funding 50:50 with us.

The students selected were: Pedro Garcia Lopez de la Osa, a music historian, who traveled to Spain to review new documents made available by the government of Spain about the treatment of artists during the Franco regime; and Patricia Holt Torrez, a microbiologist, who was invited to give a talk on biomaterials for medical use at the World Biomaterial Congress in South Korea. Both students have now completed their travels and have received their reimbursements.

We wish them both success in their future scholarly endeavors.





Walks, Talks & Tours School of Medicine Education II Building

On April 30, 2024, our Walks, Talks & Tours took us to the School of Medicine, specifically the School of Medicine Education II Building, and our tour was led by Ross French, the SOM Digital Communications Manager.

The UCR School of Medicine (SOM) welcomed its first class of students in fall of 2013, but the dream of teaching physicians at the University of California, Riverside dates back to 1971, when then – UCR Chancellor Ivan Hinderaker presented the idea of building a medical education program in Inland Southern California.

The facilities to support the SOM include the SOM Research Building, which opened in March 2011 and features faculty offices and lab space; the SOM Education Building, which opened in spring 2013, in the newly renovated Stat/Comp Building; and the SOM Education Building II, which opened in fall 2023.

Our tour began with a video welcome from the Dean, and we then progressed to walking through this 5-story building. On our tour we saw and learned:

- The building was designed and constructed in partnership with CO Architects and Hansel Phelps Construction, and cost \$100M.
- The building is almost 100,000 gross square feet.
- The building meets LEED Platinum certification and is one of the most energy efficient buildings on campus.
- The building includes a 200kW solar array.
- The building houses: classrooms, student support and study facilities, study and lounge space, specialized teaching spaces, lecture halls, academic and administrative spaces, and open terraces and patios.

In addition to our walking tour, we learned about how the dream of a UCR SOM started with Chancellor Ivan Hinderaker and began with a partnership with UCLA's Chancellor Charles Young, on a Biomedical Program. Chancellor Young was in UCR's inaugural undergraduate class, and earned his undergraduate degree at UCR and was the first student president of Associated Students of UCR. In 2013, under the leadership of Chancellor Tim White and founding Dean Richard Olds, UCR opened the SOM. And recently, the UCR SOM celebrated its 10th anniversary in 2023 after graduating nearly 400 medical doctors.







The Mary Johnson Outstanding Retiree
